











Reservations

Some sites are available for reservation at both Sunset View and Emerald Bay campgrounds. Call *Discover Camping* at 1-800-689-9025. Your reservation will specify which campground; signs showing site locations are updated daily. These signs are located at the campground entrances, and at the sani station area on Green Lake Road where the road forks – north (left) for Emerald Bay and east (straight ahead) for Sunset View.

Park Activities

-  Campers can enjoy Cariboo sunsets at Sunset View, aspen forests at Emerald Bay and waterfront camping at Arrowhead.
-  Picnic/day-use areas are at most of the sites. Day-use areas at Sunset View and Emerald Bay also feature picnic shelters.
-  All campgrounds and picnic areas have good swimming beaches. No lifeguards are on duty.
-  Group camping is available at Sunset View Group Campground, and must be reserved through the Park Facility Operator. Visit the website for details.
-  Children will enjoy the adventure playgrounds at Sunset View and Emerald Bay campgrounds.
-  Two boat launch ramps are available, one at Sunset View, the other at Little Arrowhead. The lake is usually ideal for water-skiing, but fishing can best be described as challenging.

-  Learn about the Cariboo forest by walking the self-guided nature trail located next to the campground at Sunset View.
-  The sani-station is located at the junction of North and South Green Lake roads.
-  A pay phone is located in Sunset View Campground.

Visitor Information

Only registered campers are allowed in the campground after 11:00 p.m. Quiet time is between 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.

Pets must be kept on a leash while in the park. Pets are NOT permitted on the swimming beaches at any time. Pick up after your pet.

Alcohol is permitted only within the boundaries of campsites with registered occupants.

Tents and equipment must be confined to the gravel portion of your site or to the tent pad where provided.

Campfires must not exceed 0.5 metres in size. Leaving a fire unattended is a serious offence. Fires must be fully extinguished. Please do not scavenge for firewood between campsites; dead brush provides critical wildlife habitat and puts nutrients back into the soil.

Water quality. Although Green Lake is very clean, there is almost no flushing action, so everything that goes into the lake stays in. Do not wash or use soap in the lake, and throw used wash water into toilet holes.

Let it grow. Flowers, trees and even rocks are part of the park's natural heritage. It is an offence to damage or remove them. Do not cut small saplings for wiener-sticks. These are your future shade trees.

Bears. To avoid problems with bears and other nuisance animals, lock your food in your vehicle at night. Use the garbage containers provided and maintain a clean campsite. Never feed or approach bears.

Park regulations can be enforced through fines of up to \$100 for each infraction and/or immediate eviction from the park.

Welcome. In the midst of the aspen and pine forests of the Cariboo Plateau are the jewel-like waters of Green Lake. This park, situated northeast of 70 Mile House, features warm, shallow water ideal for swimming. It is also popular with anglers, water-skiers and canoeists. The park is made up of 11 parcels of land (six of which are developed) spread out around the shore of the lake. There are 121 campsites in three campgrounds, each with a unique atmosphere.

To get to the park, follow signs from 70 Mile House on Hwy 97. Alternative routes, if coming from the north, are via Lone Butte or 83 Mile Road.
