

What You Should Know



There are 201 campsites at this park. Campsite reservations are accepted and first-come, first-served sites are also available. For reservations call 1-800-689-9025 or www.discovercamping.ca. Maximum stay is 14 days.

No electrical hookups are available.



There are 4 walk-in campsites at this park.



There is a 10-unit group campsite available. Contact the Park Facility Operator for more details.



There is a large day-use/picnicking area with ample parking, picnic tables, children's playground, picnic/shelter area and access to ocean beach.

Picnicking in campsites is not permitted.



There are wheelchair accessible campsites, showers, flush toilets and beach access in the park. Contact the Park Facility Operator for more details.



Cold water taps are located throughout the park. Taps are shut off during the off season.



Pit and flush toilets are available in the campground and the day-use area.



There are shower facilities available at the campground and day-use area.



Sani-station/dump available during the collecting season for registered campers only.



Firewood may be available for purchase. Campfire pits are provided. Fire bans may be implemented to preserve air quality or reduce fire hazard. Be prepared to bring a portable stove for cooking.



There are about 2 kilometres of nature walking trails in the park. For your own safety and preservation of the park, obey posted signs and keep to designated trails. Shortcutting trails destroys plant life and soil structure.



There is an adventure playground in campground.



Ocean swimming. The water is cooler than lake swimming. There are no lifeguards on duty.



Canoeing and kayaking are welcome at this park. Please know the ocean currents.



Saltwater/ocean fishing and freshwater fishing at Black Creek. All anglers must have a valid fishing license; refer to current *BC Environment Fishing Regulations Synopsis*.



Bicycles must keep to roadways. No cycling on trails.



Pets/domestic animals must be on a leash at all times and are not allowed in beach areas or park buildings. You are responsible for their behavior and must dispose of their excrement.

Conservation

Flowers, trees, shrubs, shells and even rocks are part of the park's natural heritage. Please do not damage or remove them. In your exploration, please remember to carefully replace overturned rocks in their original position. Look but do not remove any shells or marine organisms from the park.

Wildlife

Park users should always be aware of bears and other wildlife. Never feed or approach them.

Park Fees

Open all year. Fees are collected for services from May to September. There is a winter fee (with no services provided) charged. Campers must be self-sufficient.

Check-in: 1 p.m. for reservation holders; 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. for non-reservation holders. **Check-out:** 11 a.m. **Gates open** at 7 a.m. and **close** at 11 p.m.

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elcome to Miracle Beach

Provincial Park, located 22 kilometres north of Courtenay and 22 kilometres south of Campbell River. As a family holiday destination, few locations are better than this 137-hectare park. A broad, safe sandy beach on the ocean provides comfortable sunbathing, sandcastle building and a fascinating terrain for tidal pools to study marine life. Trails thread through the second-growth forest, home to many birds and animals.
