Please Note:

- Hazards including windfall along trail and dead standing trees near backcountry campsites and other developed facilities may be encountered along these trails.
- Backcountry facilities and campsite areas are maintained by you. Please help by packing out what you pack in and by keeping the park and the facilities clean for others. Leave knowing that you did your part.
- Please stay on the trails at all times.

Trail Difficulty Definitions

The ratings are determined based on the length of the trail section, change in elevation and trail type for the average Park Visitor.

Trail Difficulty Rating

E – Easy; **M** – Moderate; **S** – Strenuous

Trail Type Rating

Type I – 1.5 to 2.5m wide, paved, crushed gravel or boardwalk, less than 10% grade.

Type II – 1.5m wide, gravel surfacing in wet areas, up to 15% grade.

Type III – 0.5m wide, grade greater than 15%.

Type IV – up to 0.3m wide, lightly used wilderness trail, tread as worn not grubbed out, infrequent maintenance
