

* The camper's truck is parked off the camp pad. This damages vegetation and contributes to erosion.

* The radio is turned up too loud. This will disturb other visitors in the neighbouring campsites.

* The tent is off the camp pad. This destroys the fragile vegetation beside the camp pad.

* Lantern hanging from a spike in a tree. Nails and spikes in trees will weaken them and make them easy prey for insects and disease.

* The campfire is much too large. This wastes wood and contributes to the pollution of our atmosphere. If you must have a fire, keep it small and restrict it to the evening when it is most appreciated.

* There is a child too close to the fire. A small child and an unsupervised fire can be a tragic combination. Please be careful.

* Too much firewood. This campsite has enough firewood for several campsites. Take only what firewood you can use for a small evening campfire.

* Tree branches have been cut off. Many trees will die because people cut off their branches to cook wieners and marshmallows. Bring something suitable from home and keep it for your campfire cooking.

* The young boy is cutting down the park's trees. This is not only wasteful and destructive but is also illegal in any British Columbia park.

* Young girl is carving a picnic table. Same as above. This is not only destructive and expensive to repair but it is also illegal to damage any park property in a British Columbia park.

* Campstove is not on the picnic table stove stand. This will burn the picnic table and can create a fire hazard.

* There is litter on the ground. This is an open invitation for bears to visit the campsite.

* The dog is off his leash. Some will chase birds and animals and kill them if they get the chance. They can also bother the folks in the neighbouring campsite.

* Bow and arrow by the truck. It is illegal to handle or use a bow and arrow, pellet gun or firearm in a BC provincial park.

* A motorbike is running through the camp pad. In addition to being illegal, this activity is harmful to vegetation and is very disturbing to other park visitors.

* There is an axe in the picnic table. This not only damages park property, which is illegal, but it presents a hazard to the small child.

* The man is picking wild flowers. Once again, this is not allowed in a provincial park. Leave them in their natural state for others to enjoy.

* The lady is feeding a deer. You guessed it! Illegal in a provincial park. This activity accustoms animals to human food and often leads to the death of the animal as it abandons its healthy natural foods.

* There is a small fire outside the fire ring. This is unsafe for the children and presents a fire hazard to nearby trees and shrubs.

Do you see any of these conditions in your campsite? No? That's great. Keep up the good work.

Remember, we can all practice conservation. Even in small amounts, conservation and respect for the natural world around us will not only be most satisfying but will ensure the places you love to visit will always remain special.
