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California, Alaska, Oregon, Washington, Hawaii, and British Columbia join to honor efforts to improve oil spill prevention and response

The Pacific States/British Columbia Oil Spill Task Force will give its 2009 Legacy Awards for Oil Spill Prevention, Preparedness, and Response at the Clean Pacific Conference in Portland, Oregon on September 15, 2009. This year's Legacy Award winners are:

- Richard Wright, retired Pacific NW Regional Vice President of the Marine Spill Response Cooperative;
- Joseph Mullin, Manager of the Minerals Management Service's National Oil Spill Response Research Program;
- Alan Allen, an oil spill consultant working as "Spiltec"; and
- Scott Knutson, U.S. Coast Guard District 13 Response Advisory Team Supervisor.

Legacy Awards may be given to industry, non-profit, or public agency organizations and individuals, or for team efforts. The Task Force gives Legacy Awards for projects, accomplishments, or leadership that demonstrates innovation, management commitment, and improvements in oil spill prevention, preparedness, or response resulting in enhanced environmental protection. Efforts to promote partnerships and involve the public are favored. Organizations, individuals, or projects nominated for the Legacy Award should primarily be located in or operating in the Task Force jurisdictions of Alaska, British Columbia, Washington, Oregon, California, and Hawaii. Organizations or individuals representing a regulated industry must demonstrate a satisfactory history of compliance with state, provincial, and federal oil spill regulations.

Jean Cameron, Executive Coordinator for the Pacific States/British Columbia Oil Spill Task Force, characterizes the 2009 Legacy Award winners as "men who define 'legacy' by their numerous contributions to improving oil spill prevention, planning and response, not only here on the Pacific Coast, but nationally and internationally as well."

Brief details on the accomplishments of the 2009 Legacy Award winners are as follows:

Richard Wright

Richard Wright recently retired as the Regional Vice President of the Marine Spill Response Corporation (MSRC) Pacific/Northwest Region, which encompasses Washington, Oregon, and Hawaii. Prior to the merger of the Clean Sound Cooperative, Inc. with MSRC in April of 2005, he was the President of Clean Sound. He is also a retired U. S. Coast Guard Captain. In April of 2005, Mr. Wright expertly guided the MSRC merger with Clean Sound; this merger has enhanced the readiness and response capabilities in Washington, Oregon, and Hawaii by making a larger inventory of resources available. Richard Wright has always felt his role was to be a significant liaison and honest broker between the oil/gas industry, agencies, tribes, other contractors, and the interested public. He has been successful in achieving this goal by contributing to an improved understanding of issues and by communicating common goals among all parties. Joseph Mullin

Joe Mullin has been the Program Manager for the U.S. Department of the Interior, Minerals Management Service's (MMS) Nationwide Oil Spill Response Research (OSRR) Program for more than 18 years; in that capacity he is responsible for research priorities and the management of contractual research. Mr. Mullin's research has focused on the study of crude oil's chemical and physical properties, remote sensing, mechanical oil recovery, in-situ burning, chemical treating agents and dispersants, and arctic spill response. He is directly involved in the evaluation of many different types of oil spill response equipment and techniques as well as the development and testing of numerous oil spill countermeasures such as fire-resistant booms, skimmers for broken ice conditions, in-situ burning in various environments, and cold water dispersant effectiveness. His experience with in-situ burning of oil derives from participation in more than 200 research burns in the U.S., Canada, and overseas. Under Mr. Mullin's direction, MMS's OSRR program has successfully developed, coordinated and managed more than 150 research projects and technical assessment studies; project reports are available at www.mms.gov/tarphome. His collaborative efforts are extensive and he has worked with all major North American and European R&D Programs. Mr. Mullin has authored or co-authored 134 scientific papers, technical articles and peer-reviewed publications. He has conducted scientific presentations at numerous national and international oceanographic, hydrographic, and oil spill conferences. In addition, Joe has been responsible for the successful operation and management of Ohmsett – the National Oil Spill Response Test Facility located at the U.S. Naval Weapons Station in Leonardo, New Jersey (www.ohmsett.com) - for more than 16 years. Ohmsett is the only facility in the world that allows full-scale oil spill response testing, training and research on a variety of oils in a marine environment under controlled conditions. His perseverance has directly led to significant positive results in the areas of response planning, training, cross-border communications, equipment testing, and oil spill drill facilitation and evaluation. Among other accomplishments, Mr. Knutson has contributed to improvements in pumps used for viscous oil, he co-chaired the first National Maritime Salvage Conference, he has provided first-responder training for Coastal Tribes, and he organizes the annual NW Oil Spill Course as well as the annual "Ad Hoc Equipment Meeting" to critique the latest spill response technologies. He has been successful with the interested public, contingency plan holders, tribal members, contractors, and Canadian governmental officials, all for the benefit of spill prevention and response.
